

The S&P 500, Euro STOXX 50, FTSE 100 and Nikkei 225 were all down 12.4%, 16.2%, 13.4% and 9.8% respectively. Coronavirus fears also disturbed the alliance between OPEC and Russia, pushing oil prices to their worst one-day drop in thirty years. As a result, Brent Crude oil fell 43.2% over the month. Further, central banks across the globe cut interest rates and restarted quantitative easing programs in order to keep borrowing costs low, improve liquidity and protect their economies from the effects of the coronavirus. US and UK 10-year bonds decreased by 48 and 9 basis points respectively. The pound was down 3.3% against the US dollar and 2.8% against the euro.

Performance Since Inception (01/07/2014)³




